What size locker do I Need?

The size of your lockers needs to accommodate the needs of your staff or customers. For example, to hang a uniform you will need a full length or half-length space, whereas if your lockers are primarily going to be used for storing personal effects, smaller lockers will be the smarter investment.

Should you use smaller lockers?

Using smaller lockers can allow you to maximize the number of lockers; however, it'll reduce total locker space. While size and dimensions are huge factors when deciding on your lockers, you also need to figure out the material that you're going to use.

What size is a bathroom with a shower?

A bathroom with a shower is generally considered to be a "bath," as it only has a sink, a shower and a toilet. The size of your shower will vary, but the smallest bathroom that typically can support this will be anywhere between 26-30 square feet. The common dimensions for this size is either 9'x3 or 8'x4 which consists of the small range of things.

What makes a perfect locker layout?

The key to a perfect layout is to achieve a balance of comfort and usability whilst optimising your available space. So, the first requirement is to establish the number of users and available space allocated for the lockers.

How big should a bathroom be?

Primary bathrooms, typically attached to the main bedroom, can vary widely in size, from a modest 40 square feet to over 100 square feet in more luxurious setups. If you're dreaming of adding a walk-in shower, plan for at least 36 square feet for the shower alone.

How big should a shower enclosure be?

You'll need to allow for a space at least 80cm wide for showering, with any enclosure optimally 190cm high. Unless you have a very large space with the shower in a distinct zone, it's generally preferable to allow for glass, as here, or other panels to contain the shower water.
