Nouakchott solar PV Park is a 15MW solar PV power project. It is located in Nouakchott, Mauritania. According to GlobalData, who tracks and profiles over 170,000 power plants worldwide, the project is currently active. It has been developed in a single phase. Post completion of construction, the project got commissioned in April 2013.

The power station is the largest wind power plant in Mauritania, with a capacity of 102.375 MW. The wind farm consists of 39 turbines manufactured by Siemens-Gamesa, each with a capacity of 2.625 megawatts. The



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power station is owned by of the German conglomerate Siemens and the Spanish wind turbine manufacturer Siemens Gamesa.
